Grant Helps Grow Capacity at Emergency Shelter

Big changes are coming to Shelter House in the form of a huge construction project. Thanks to a capital grant for \$286,076 from the Florida Coalition Against Domestic Violence (FCADV), our replaced with an eight-foot security fence. confidential emergency shelter will receive an extreme makeover!

The greatest need that will be addressed by this project is increased bed space to accommodate more survivors and longer stays during busier times. By the end of construction, the shelter will

grow from 24 to 32 beds, not including the addition of six new cribs.

This project entails more than simply adding space. Part of the existing shelter will be configured into a studio apartment with its own bathroom, kitchen, sitting room and sleeping area. This will serve as a safe place for survivors and their family members with unique situations such as a male victim. someone with a

communicable disease or a mother whose child has an illness or special needs.

Another portion of the shelter will be converted into a large dorm room with an attached bath for single women. This room will not only create four more bed spaces, but will also accommodate single women so they are not displaced by a new incoming family. On occasion, this room could also be used to house large families so older children can stay in the same bedroom as their mother and younger siblings.

With the addition and remodel, two new bathtubs will be installed. Bathtubs are particularly important to mothers of small children.

In addition to adding more beds and bathrooms, the renovations will include a complete overhaul of the shelter security and telephone systems. A safety corridor requiring entrants to be buzzed through two doors will be added to the front entrance to keep staff and residents safe in the event an abuser learns the location of the shelter.

The kitchen in shelter is also due for a renovation. Universal access updates will be made by changing the countertop height and adding pull out cabinets. The remodel will address the increase in people living in shelter by splitting the kitchen into two workable spaces with two sinks, stoves and dishwashers. This will alleviate congestion at meal time.

doors will be put in place.

Finally, the great room in the shelter currently has a sunken floor. Raising that floor to the level of the rest of the house will improve accessibility to every room in the shelter, the recreation room and the backyard.

This is a huge project that will begin by the end of this calendar year and be complete by June 2015. The shelter will remain fully operational during all of the construction.

Shelter House has been operating at or near capacity, and this renovation will enable us to increase the comfort, convenience and security of the shelter for all residents.

Message from the Executive Director, Michelle Sperzel

Last month I was in a seminar for Shelter House with several of our community law enforcement partners. The guest speaker was domestic violence survivor Susan Still. She has appeared on "20/20" and "The Oprah Winfrey Show", and her mission is to tell her story and help break the cycle of domestic violence in our communities.

She answered the questions "Why did you stay?" and "How did you finally leave?". While praising prosecutors and victim advocates who helped her, Susan talked about how they have to be sensitive that many victims are less concerned with broken laws than how they will feed themselves and their children after leaving their abuser. Like many victims, she stayed with her husband for so long for emotional, familial and financial reasons.

Susan gave an example that drove the point home about taking risks regardless of fear. She said, "Imagine going through your morning routine – getting up, working out, showering, getting the kids ready for school and leaving the house. Now imagine doing all those things knowing that when you walk out the front door you are never going to come back to the house. All the kids have are the items in their backpacks, and all you have are the items in your purse. Now imagine that fear you have and multiply that by 50, and that is a little bit of what I felt on the day I left my home."

Hearing her speak from the heart about her experiences and life after abuse inspired me to really look at our advocates, programs and services and ask the question "Is there more we can do to help victims?" What I keep coming back to is that we always need to look at what we are doing through the lens of someone who needs safety and advocacy.

We need to meet each woman, child and man where they are and adjust OUR way of

thinking, referrals and safety planning method to each individual person. When I think about the thousands of people we help every year, I think about the enormous amount of flexibility it takes to do this work, the need to approach each person and create a plan that is unique to them and their needs. There is no one size fits most or a cookie cutter response, and best practice sometimes means starting from scratch.

Susan's speech was a great reminder that even though our advocates and law enforcement respond to the same situations over and over again, they are not the same and each situation needs to be approached with an open mind and open heart. I will say it time and time again – the survivors we help are the bravest people I know. They are fearless to leave everything they know to seek out a different life. We are here to help and support them along the way. Thank you for trusting us to do this work and for making a difference in our community.

Economic Empowerment Program Receives New and Renewed Support



Shelter House's economic empowerment and financial education program recently received a boost through grants from The Allstate Foundation and Boeing. The Allstate Foundation continued its support with a \$30,000 grant, and Boeing came on board as a supporter for the

first time with a \$5,000 grant award.

Through the WAM! (Women and Money) and YES! (Youth Economic Strategies), Shelter House offers free workshops and an annual conference to the community as well as to our participants.

Economic literacy is important for everyone, but domestic violence victims face unique financial barriers that also affect their safety. Women leaving abusive relationships often have bad credit, liens, limited education, limited job skills and spotty job history. Learning how to manage money is vital as they move toward independence and safety.

Workshops for youth set them up for a lifetime of financial confidence and success. YES! workshops include topics such as money management, job readiness skills, budgeting, saving, credit, college admission and financial aid.

The next offering is a Day of WAM! on Saturday, October 26 from 10am to 3pm at the First Baptist Church of Crestview. Attendees will learn about important topics like loans, credit, identity theft, budgeting, retirement planning and more. There is no fee to attend, and lunch will be provided. In addition to the workshops and conference, the economic empowerment program allows Shelter House to offer individual development accounts (IDAs) to our participants whereby they can work toward financial goals. A participant deposits money into an account, and Shelter House matches it two to one for goals such as debt reduction, housing, transportation, education and microenterprise.


