The WAM! Program is Changing Financial Lives

It has been more than a year since the WAM! (Women and Money) economic empowerment program, made possible by The Allstate Foundation, has become an integral piece of Shelter House's services. The program reaches not only victims of domestic violence, but members of the community as well.

Many of the participants that come to Shelter House and participate in the WAM! workshops are not the sole income earner for their household or their income may not come from a typical source such as a job. Shelter House is teaching our participants financial skills and tips about budgeting and saving income. In some cases, Shelter House is helping individuals move from being unbanked or under banked to opening up a savings account.

We want to share the experiences of some of our past WAM! participants. Please read their stories and see how going through the WAM! program has changed their financial life and in turn improved their quality of life. (The names have been changed to protect the participants).

Mary: "I thought I knew all I needed to know about money, but I was really surprised when I learned about budgeting and savings. I thought I didn't need a budget, but when I learned that I could save money I was very interested. As we went through creating a budget and savings plan, I realized that if I put a few dollars from my paycheck into a Christmas Club savings account I would have money to buy Christmas gifts for my family without the stress of finding the money to spend.

Then I thought I could put a few more dollars into a saving account in case I had something unexpected come up, and wouldn't you know it—we had something come up and I was able to take care of it without worrying about when my next dollar would come in or what bill I would have to skip that month.

When we covered coupons I was ready to pay attention and once again it paid off. I was able to buy more groceries (or some of the things that I would not normally buy) and had food on the table for me and my family.

These things have made a huge difference in my life and I tell everyone that I meet to go to the WAM! workshops. It really will make a difference in your life. I guarantee that you will learn something valuable using the resources provided to make your life better."

Erin: "The WAM! program came at the perfect time for me. I had just graduated college and wasn't making a lot of money but had the bills and responsibilities of an adult. I felt like I was drowning in my debt, but the lessons I learned from the WAM! workshops gave me the strength to organize my finances and make the best out of my situation.

Today, I am not behind on any of my bills. Everything I had in collections is paid off. I stick to a strict budget and am finally able to put money into savings with every paycheck. Budgeting and couponing are my friends. Soon, I will begin an IRA and have a goal to purchase my first home in a year. My motto right now is that as long as my bills are paid and I continue to move forward, I am alright!"

Jane: "My finances are something that keep me up at night and make me sick to my stomach. When I first heard about Shelter House's WAM! program I figured that because I am not a battered woman, these classes aren't for me, or so I thought. The classes were free so I decided to call the office and ask what they were teaching.

I had good habits that the class helped me expand upon like making a shopping list and collecting coupons. I have been saving \$50 on my grocery bills! I had bad habits too that I have ended, like not opening my bills when they arrived. I have a schedule and open my bills once a week. I have a pay down schedule for my credit cards and have successfully paid off two cards. One of them had a 22% interest rate! Right now, I am tracking my expenses so that I can set up a realistic budget rather than a pie in the sky budget that I will never be able to keep.

The biggest tip I learned is that I am in control of my finances. I feel more empowered about my money skills. Some of the tips have become habits and I am working on including more of them into my spending and saving habits."

Here are quotes from two victims of financial abuse who have gone through the WAM! program:

"The class couldn't have come at a better time for me. I am working towards transitioning out of transitional housing and this class gave me information to help me financially plan for the future."

"In class it was said that when you fail to plan, you plan to fail. That was so eye opening for me."

Message from the Executive Director, Michelle Sperzel

Spring has arrived with a wave of activity at Shelter House. We launched our new website, held our first Princess and Pirate Ball, started our YES! (Youth Economic Strategies) workshops at Youth Village, finished our children's room, launched our new intern program and are knee-deep in planning our WAM! Conference. Our hotline has been busy with an increase in calls and many people are coming in for one-on-one counseling sessions.

Even though our offices are busy, I can't help but think of all the individuals we have yet to help and so many stories we still haven't heard. I cannot tell you the number of women and men who tell me their story after they find out what I do. Sometimes there isn't the message of hope or happily ever after. Nonetheless, they are the faces of domestic violence in our community. We need to talk about it. We need to share what happens so that as a community we can continue to address the issues of violence in our homes. Here are some of the stories that have been shared with me over the past few weeks.

After a presentation at a local church a woman in her 80's told me she will never forget the night her father hit her mother in front of her. She said she regretted not telling her siblings until after her father had passed because once she told them, they all shared stories about

said she is still ashamed of keeping the instance to herself and thanked me for the work that we do in the community. It is her hope that other little girls tell their mommy that daddy isn't supposed to be mean and there are people who can help.

Several weeks ago I sat next to a woman on a plane who told me her story of dating violence. The relationship lasted a year, but she got so caught up in the drama and yelling that she said it felt like a lifetime. At first she thought all the dinners and gifts were because he loved her, and she loved the attention. But the attention got to be too much; too many calls, too many gifts. He would offer to pay for everything so she felt like she had this great gift. She was a college freshman with a new car. an amazing apartment, dinner and dancing whenever she wanted. She said, "I became so reliant on the financial support I felt trapped. My girlfriends told me to put up with the yelling and hitting because I was getting a great deal." She was able to get out of the relationship because of a school counselor that looked her in the eyes and told her, "You are a battered woman. You don't deserve to have someone tracking your every move. You are a young woman free to make your own choices. You can hang out with your friends, your family and someone should add to that, not take

the violence they witnessed in their home. She you from it." She lost friends, left school, sold her car and moved home. She is in the process of applying to a school closer to home so she can get out of debt and rebuild her life.

> I also met an airman that told me about his shock and anger when he found out that his sister had been abused for two years and had kept it from the family. She is still in the relationship because of his nieces and nephews. He set up a bank account for his sister and makes monthly deposits. He is hoping that one day she will use the money to get a divorce and leave. He said the hard part is knowing that she needs to make the choice. He said, "I want to shake her and tell her that it doesn't need to be like this but all I can do is live my life and tell her I love her no matter what. I think she will leave someday. And when she does, I'll have her back."

> These are the stories of the people you help. They are stories that need to be shared. We can't just talk about domestic violence once a quarter or once a year we need to talk about it everyday! This past year, more than 85 children have taken refuge at Shelter House and have been able to play, eat and sleep in a home free of domestic violence. This has been possible because of the Destin Charity Wine Auction Foundation (DCWAF) and donors like you.

A child therapist that has spent 58 hours healing the wounds of children who have witnessed domestic violence in their homes. These children have spent 1,625 nights worry-free and safe in a confidential domestic violence shelter.
