Myth Busting: The Surprising Truth About Who You Are Helping

When you think about Shelter House and the services we provide, you probably think about a woman fleeing an abusive relationship and coming to our emergency shelter. While that is certainly a big part of what we do, Shelter House is so much more to many different types of people.

Did you know our advocates spent more than 1,100 hours last year working with children? These are the children of domestic violence survivors who are in our shelter, transitional housing or outreach programs. Some of these kids also work with their moms and a licensed child therapist on things like how to express feelings, including anger, in a healthy way.

The Youth Department recently took kids from shelter, transitional housing and outreach on a dolphin cruise during Spring Break. Though the weather was chilly, the dolphins cooperated and delighted everyone on board by frolicking alongside the boat. Every child also had a turn in

the captain's chair. Limousine transportation and a picnic in the park after the cruise made the adventure even more special.

Getting out of the shelter and having a carefree day just like any other kid on Spring Break was a wonderful experience for all the children. One boy who has not been very expressive, particularly of positive emotions, since coming into shelter told the advocates during the cruise, "I'm super duper happy!"

While not all of the children are old enough to understand how they are connected, getting out on the water and having fun was a real bonding experience for them and friendships were formed. We are already planning another outing in August when kids from Children in Crisis will also join us. Much of our youth programming is supported by funding from Destin Charity Wine Auction Foundation.

Another group Shelter House services that you might not think of-abused men. Yes, there are men who are victims of domestic violence, and yes, we are here to help them.

Shelter House opened our doors to our first man in the emergency shelter last year. Like many of the women we work with, George* was physically and verbally abused at home by his spouse. He knew he wasn't safe in his own home and didn't want his children to continue seeing the abuse at the hands of their mother. While working through the legal system, he and the kids needed a safe place to stay and turned to Shelter House.

This was new territory for our advocates. They had discussions with the women staying in shelter at the time to be sure they would still feel safe with a man in the house. The women all agreed he needed a safe place to stay just like they did and

welcomed George into shelter.

While George was in shelter, he received the same services as any other resident-peer counseling, referrals, services for his kids. After three weeks in shelter. George and his children were able to move out and safely return to their home.

When you give of your time, your talents or your resources to support

Shelter House, you never know who you might be helping. Yes, there are young women who come to us with fresh bruises. But there are also women who come to us after 30 years in an abusive marriage. There are pregnant women. There are mothers with five children. As you see from George's example, there are men whose wives have terrorized them for years. There are the children of victims who have witnessed more violence than you can imagine in their young lives. We work with young and old, rich and poor, straight and gay.

For anyone who has been touched by domestic violence, Shelter House's door is always open.

Purple Paws Kennel Update



April is Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Month. Since announcing the addition of the Purple Paws Kennel to our emergency shelter, we've made great progress.

One bedroom in the shelter has been designated "pet-friendly", and we are already accepting pocket pets such as hamsters, gerbils and fish. This room has been outfitted with a special HEPA filter to cut down on the exposure of allergens to other residents.

A dog run in the backyard has already been completed, and the concrete for the kennel has been poured. Construction on the cat room is about 75% complete.

The Purple Paws Kennel would not be a reality without the generous support of the Dugas Foundation and generous individuals like you.

Message from the Executive Director, Michelle Sperzel

Think about the last time you tried something for the first time. Depending on your age that might be a little more difficult... but try it. Ok, now ask yourself why you haven't tried something new lately. Is it fear? Are you too old? Is it a financial risk you are unwilling to take? Do you think you will fail? Do you think you will succeed and then be expected to do it again and again?

When a woman comes into our emergency shelter or outreach offices, she is looking for a new start, solutions to a problem or a safe place for her family. She is often dealing with many firsts - the first time on her own, the first time she is raising her children by herself, the first time she has controlled her finances or even the first time she has ever needed help. For some women in our transitional housing program, it is their first apartment or the first time they are cooking a holiday meal. These are things we all take for granted because, for most of us, it is something that we have or have already done. These are all very basic normal life firsts, and they are what Shelter House provides to women and children when they come to us. It is because of supporters like

you that we are able to provide this support.

The women, children and men we work with come in with the same fears I asked you to think about. Some don't think they can make it on their own. Some are more scared to raise their children on their own than they are of the violence in their home. Some are terrified that it is too late for them to make a huge life change and leave the abusive life they are living. But do you know what? They do it.

A few months ago I was approached by a woman who did just that a year ago. She faced all her fears and moved into shelter. The woman who approached me told me that she is a career woman. She said you wouldn't think to look at her that she would have used our services, but she did. She came to shelter with her two young children to escape her abusive husband. She told me all she needed was some time to be in a safe place and figure out her next steps. She spoke to staff about her short-term and long-term life plans. She said she wrote them down and realized how much she hadn't been living but merely surviving. She

said that really looking at what she had created as a "comfort zone" was not even a space that was physically safe. She said the staff treated her with respect and spoke to her about choices and options. She started to create a new comfort zone which included being on her own rather than floating from one relationship to the next. She said she is now a proud single mom, and she encourages her children to go safely outside their zone because that is where life happens.

Thank you for helping women and children start new lives. As you move through spring, I challenge all of you to think of the things you take for granted like your friends, family and home and imagine having to give all of that up. We need to acknowledge the courage and strength that it takes for a woman to leave her home and come to a place where someone is willing to help her and her family start a new life, where she can push herself out of her comfort zone. I also encourage you to think about the thing you haven't done yet and try it.
